ISSUE 6: READING FOR MEANING – WHY KNOWLEDGE MATTERS

At THPS, we're deeply committed to ensuring every child becomes a confident, capable reader - not just someone who can "sound out" words, but someone who can *understand* and think deeply about what they're reading.

Phonics is essential, but it's just the beginning.

Reading comprehension depends on much more than decoding. It requires a strong vocabulary, background knowledge, and the ability to connect ideas across different texts and contexts. The more a student knows, the easier it is for them to make meaning from what they read.

Here's how we support this in our classrooms:

- We explicitly teach vocabulary. Not just difficult words, but rich, nuanced language across all subjects
- We build knowledge systematically, making sure students encounter key ideas repeatedly over time
- We read a wide range of texts, from fiction to nonfiction, to build on knowledge and build curiosity

Our reading program isn't just about cracking the code. It's about unlocking ideas, expanding horizons, and building understanding that lasts.

Next week, we'll share what we do when students need extra support and how we make sure that support still connects to the rich, meaningful learning happening in the classroom.

LIBRARY NEWS


